

END POVERTY IN ALL ITS FORMS EVERYWHERE

EQUAL ACCESS

At USJ we are aware that education is a powerful tool to address poverty. Equal access to education can help students from low-income backgrounds find success, build more resilient communities, and create positive change. To promote accessibility, USJ has established a set of policies for admission and success targets, as well as, financial, housing, academic, and counselling support measures targeting local and international students from low-income backgrounds. As the COVID-19 epidemic worsened in our region at the start of 2020, several of our students faced unexpected financial pressures. In response, USJ quickly established a Hardship Fund to help release students from those pressures and allow them to continue their studies. In the 2022-2023 academic year, 3% of our lowincome students were receiving financial aid, among which 68% of them were from developing countries.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND SUSTAINABLE BUSINESSES

Sustainable businesses contribute to economic development and have a positive impact on the community. USJ partners with the local government and other organisations to provide opportunities for entrepreneurs to development sustainable businesses. We are committed to offering start-up opportunities through training programmes, capital investment, resource allocation, sharing of space, and networking.

In 2022-2023 academic year, relevant activities included the <u>cooperation</u> with <u>Sustainable Development Association</u> in the promotion of sustainable development and education, as well as the support for startups incubation and acceleration. A <u>masters' talk series</u> has been organised for students to learn about the business and employment opportunities in the Greater Bay Area.

Access to basic services

In oder to promote access to basic resources – such as food, water, and hoursing – for economically marginalised groups, our students regularly engage in volunteer and fundraising activities for charity events, such as Macao's Caritas Bazaar.

DINING SERVICES

Lack of access to food is a leading cause of death worldwide (UN, 2021). Although Macao is a relatively wealthy city, USJ is aware of the diverse needs of students from various socio-economic backgrounds and with different eating habits. USJ is making efforts to improve our canteen services—which cater to members of USJ and also the students and staff of a local secondary school—by increasing healthy, affordable, and sustainable food choices, and including vegetarian and vegan options.

FOOD WASTE REDUCTION

Food waste is a global issue. Some estimate that 25-30% of total food produced is lost or wasted (IPCC, 2019).

In order to contribute reducing food waste, a <u>food waste monitoring</u> system has been introduced in our campus canteen.

MENTAL-HEALTH

Health and well-being are essential for a sustainable society. In the 2022-2023 academic year, 12% of our students graduated with degrees in the field of Psychology, equipped to promote the mental health and well-being of communities.

POLICIES AND SUPPORT

USJ provides free mental health support to our students and staff through our counselling services, which also refer sexual health issues to the appropriate health services. USJ is a smoke-free campus. The use of tobacco products is prohibited in enclosed buildings and facilities, as well as during events, whether indoor or outdoor. To accommodate the needs of some students and staff, we do provide a designated 'smoking allowed' restricted area away from the main part of campus.

COLLABORATIONS

Partnerships are vital to the promotion of the SDGs. USJ partners with the Macao government and other organisations to promote the health of Macao's population.

In 2022-2023 academic year, USJ collaborated with local organisation to conduct a <u>study</u>, which aimed to help the local government entities to improve the mental well-being of aging population.


HEALTH SERVICE

FIRST GENERATION STUDENTS

Obtaining a higher education degree is important for breaking cycles of exclusion. In 2022-2023 academic year, about 6% of our enrolled students reported they were the first in their immediate families to enrol in university.

TEACHER TRAINING

USJ invests greatly in the training of the next generation of teachers. In 2022-2023 academic year, more than 58% of our graduates obtained teaching qualifications, and over 24% of graduates obtained primary school teaching qualifications.

LIFELONG LEARNING

To support the integration of learning throughout life, USJ offers a variety of services and activities targeting the wider community. Our policy, is that all services and activities be accessible to all, regardless of age, ethnicity, religion, disability, or gender. Our educational outreach programme for prison inmates, running since 2009, provides incarcerated individuals with access to higher education and contributes to their eventual reintegration in society.

WATER STEWARDSHIP

Water is an essential and finite resource that should be protected. At USJ, we are committed to our Green Campus Environmental Action Plan, which includes rainwater harvesting and recycling systems. The USJ campus is equipped with drinking fountains on each floor, both to promote access to free drinking water and to motivate students and staff to bring their own reusable water bottles, which minimizes plastic consumption and waste.

WATER CONSERVATION

USJ supports water conservation offcampus and collaborates with the local government and NGOs to ensure clean water resources are maintained. Much of our Institute of Science and Environment's direct action is focused on mangrove conservation. Among the many ecosystem benefits of mangroves, coastal protection and their ability to filter toxic materials make them crucial battlegrounds in the fight for the conservation of water resources.


ENSURE ACCESS TO AFFORDABLE, RELIABLE, SUSTAINABLE AND MODERN ENERGY FOR ALL

Excessive use of fossil fuels is the major cause of climate change in the world today. At USJ we are committed to the use of alternative and cleaner energy sources, such as solar panels, and solar-powered water heating, and to the reduction of our energy needs through the use of low energy consumption and LED bulbs. Launched in 2019, our fully equipped Green Campus incorporates green technologies for the reduction of energy consuption, including:

- Solar power electricity panels
- Solar-powered hot water heating
- Energy recovery in ventilation systems and chillers
- Low consumption bulbs and LED bulbs
- Low transmission glazing
- Crossflow ventilation chimneys
- Rainwater harvesting and recycling systems
- Ledger green strips and fins
- Rooftop gardens

Obtaining a higher education degree is important for breaking cycles of exclusion and USJ is committed to provide a diversified culture and environment to the students.

For students in our care, we provide a wide range of support measures to meet the <u>financial</u>, <u>housing</u>, academic, and <u>counselling</u> needs of students from underrepresented groups, as well as <u>students</u> with special needs.

USJ promotes equal access to education and work for people with disabilities in accordance with the <u>Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities</u>. In 2022-2023 academic year, our students body included roughly 0.4% of students with disabilities, and 6% of our students originate from developing countries.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Our educational <u>outreach programme</u> <u>for prison inmates</u>, running since 2009, has been allowing access of incarcerated individuals to higher education, and contributing their reintegration in society.

To advocate universal sign language education and promote a disability-friendly society in Macao, <u>USJ signed a partnership</u> with <u>Macau Deaf Association</u> in 2022. In 2022-2023 academic year, USJ provide the <u>first Sign Language training program</u> to the professional social work community in Macau.

Furthermore, a lecture on <u>Supporting</u> <u>Visually Impaired Education</u> was organised this year, aiming to raise awareness and also support social integration of the disabled.

ENVIRONMENTAL OUTREACH

In 2022-2023 academic year, USJ held a series of environmental education activities, including delivering educational talks in <u>local schools</u> and launching <u>mobile exhibitions</u>, to further promote community involvement in coastal protection and mangrove conservation. USJ also participated and delivered a talk about mangrove conservation in the <u>Urban Biodiversity and Data Technology Forum 2023.</u>

DIRECT ACTION

Our Institute of Science and Environment (ISE) is unique in Macao for its academic focus. Much of the Institute's direct-action work is focused on mangrove conservation. Among the many ecosystem benefits of mangroves, coastal protection and carbon sequestration place them at the forefront of adaptation to climate change and mitigation measures.

Continued the actions taken in previous years, USJ devoted effort in the mangrove planting activities in 2022-2023 academic year. Furthermore, numbers of coastal clean-up activities were held to make Macao's coast cleaner and the oceans safer.

PARTNERSHIPS

Since 2019-2020 academic year, USJ partnered with the <u>Clean the World Foundation</u>—a global leader in water sanitation, hygiene, and sustainability—and <u>Las Vegas Sands Corp.</u> to facilitate The <u>Drop by Drop Project in Macao.</u>

This project's aim is to investigate ways to enhance local water quality through the use of native wetland plants such as mangroves, which act as natural water purifiers for water pollution and reduce water-related risks (e.g., flooding due to storm surges). The project also studies ecosystem rehabilitation and maintenance, as well as enhancement and protection of biodiversity in the local coastal wetland ecosystems.

In commemoration of World Environment Day 2023, a <u>recycled artwork exhibition</u> was organised to raise awareness of plastic pollution and emphasize importance of protecting our oceans and coastal systems.
